What Has Your Township Done Well?

- a. The wages for the elected township officials for the term beginning May 15, 2017 through May 17, 2021 were frozen to enable cost savings.
- Created a fund to budget for cemeteries in this township to help with maintenance costs.
- c. FOIA requests have been responded to in a timely manner.
- d. Joined with Douglas Township to help with handling the General Assistance Fund for Mason Township
- e. No bonded indebtedness
- f. Purchased township property to store needed rock supplies, culverts, sand, etc.
- g. Have provided superior services and benefits while minimizing cost.

What Inefficiencies can Mason Township Identify / What Are our Next Steps?

a. The General Assistance Fund has been inefficient because most people in the township don't qualify, and the funds are there to help people. We are getting educated on ways to use the fund to help people that are homeless or without needed funds and also, for people that are traveling through this township and needing help to travel on to their next destination.

Our committee's recommendation regarding Increased Accountability and Efficiency:

a. To increase Accountability, Mason Township plans to partner with Douglas Township to help people in need. We will continue to learn about new ways to use the General Assistance Fund to help the people in Mason Township. There are many low-income residents in the township that don't qualify for General Assistance because they don't meet the guidelines. We try to find them other outside resources that township residents may find helpful. Examples: Food Pantries, Churches, etc. We also want to help people traveling through the township that have been stranded and don't have the funds to make it to their destination.

PART TWO: MASON ROAD DISTRICT

Mason Road District partners with, or have Intergovernmental Agreements with the following other governments:

What has the Road District done well?

a. The Road Commissioner is always available to hear the concerns of Township residents.

- b. He responds quickly to fix or repair township roads, bridges, and ditches due to flooding or trees down after a storm.
- c. He is always checking the maintenance of the township roads, snow plowing, oiling roads, etc.
- d. No bonded indebtedness.
- e. The Road District has low labor costs and employs only part-time employees.
- f. The Road District has established a multi-year plan for constructing a building to house the township equipment.
- g. The Road Commissioner provides superior services while minimizing costs.

What Inefficiencies can Mason Road District Identify/What Are our next steps?

- a. An inefficiency is the lack of funds for the Road District to oil all roads in the township each year. Now, only half of the roads get oiled one year and the other half the next year.
- b. A township building to house the township trucks, grader, backhoe, and equipment to keep it out of the weather is an inefficiency.

Our committee's recommendation regarding Increased Accountability and Efficiency:

- a. Continue budgeting for funds for road maintenance. Be mindful of cost savings and low labor costs.
- b. Keep budgeting for a building to be built to house the township trucks, grader, backhoe, and equipment to keep it out of the weather. The equipment would be better maintained and kept well if stored in a building. Now everything is stored outside.
